

### **Oil Tips for Beginners**

I'm so excited you have decided to embrace painting with oil! I started my oil painting journey about 3 years ago, and although I don't consider myself an expert, hopefully this doc will help you set up a safe and enjoyable painting environment where you can truly explore your creativity. Painting is a continuous learning process. Don't be afraid to try new things you learn from others to find what best works for you!! Feel free to reach out to me if you have questions. **NOTE:** this document covers in studio painting only, as Plein Air, or outdoor painting, is a different animal.

### A List of My Favorite Paint Colors and Brands

Note, these are my personal recommendations after lots of trial and error, hours on YouTube and workshops with great master painters. It is my goal to help make your early endeavors into oils affordable and fun. Let's get started!!

## **Painting Supplies**

**Oil Paint** – while it is tempting to buy the student grade oil paint, I have found that spending just a few dollars more for artist grade will yield better results, less frustration and last you longer, because the main ingredient is the **pigment**, not the fillers. You will be able to mix better colors and get the desired results you are looking for. Keep in mind, most brands have the same colors but may be called different names and they may not be exactly the same. Initially this won't matter but over time, you will find the brand and colors that work best for you. You can find out exactly what the pigment is by reading the label.

- PY = Pigment Yellow
- PO = Pigment Orange
- PR = Pigment Red
- PV = Pigment Violet
- PB = Pigment Blue
- PG = Pigment Green
- PBr = Pigment Brown
- PBk = Pigment Black
- PW = Pigment White
- PM = Pigment Metal

In addition to the pigment, you should also know whether the paint is TRANSPARENT, SEMI-OPAQUE, or OPAQUE. You can generally find this in the description of the paint as well as on the tube. On most tubes you will find a little square box on the back. Transparent is a box with just outlines, Semi-Opaque is a box with half of it filled in and Opaque is a box completely filled in. I use a combination of the 3 as I like to do my first layer of painting in all transparent paint. This is how I get my most vibrant colors. Transparent paint can also help you mix color variations with opaque paint to make minor color adjustments and save overall paint use. Starting out, I would recommend the following brands: Gamblin, Winsor & Newton and Rembrandt. I have a few favorites from other brands I will share at the end of this doc and why.

#### **Palettes**

There are 3 basic palettes you can use, wood, glass and disposable paper. You will see many painters on YouTube using a wood palette they hold in their hand. They now come in other, easier to clean surfaces. You will also see painters using glass as this is inexpensive and can be reused over and over. Both of these require you to keep them clean. You would need a blade scraper and solvent to do this. I started using glass and found it was a lot of work to keep clean and I could not easily store my leftover paint. The third option, and my favorite is **Richeson Gray Matters Palette Paper**. It comes in multiple sizes to suit your needs. You can buy it at <a href="https://www.dickblick.com">www.dickblick.com</a> or <a href="https://www.dickblick.com">www.jerrysartarama.com</a> I like the gray tone as it gives you a much more accurate color when mixing your paint and can be thrown away when done. I frequently transfer my leftover paint to a new sheet for mixing room and continue using the same paint for days. If you use this, **DO NOT THROW AWAY** your oil paint at the end of a painting session. You can cover it lightly with plastic wrap and use for days. You can also store it flat in your freezer for weeks on a cookie tray.

#### **Brushes**

Buying brushes can be overwhelming! There are so many to choose from. Over time you will find what you like based on your style and desired brush stroke you want. Starting out you don't need to invest in expensive brushes. Just make sure you are buying brushes designed for use with oil paints and if you also paint in acrylics, keep your brushes separate. Your brush should be appropriate for the size of canvas or surface you



are working on. Bigger canvas, bigger brush. If you want to paint loose, I suggest using a ¾" brush for surfaces that are 11" or greater. You may want a few smaller brushes when you get to the detail step in your painting. I buy these two brands in bulk as they are inexpensive. I can throw the away when they are worn.

If you are an experienced painter in another medium you may want to try the more expensive brushes from <a href="https://www.rosemaryandco.com">www.rosemaryandco.com</a> These brushes are now my preferred brushes. NOTE: They come from the UK. They take time to deliver. If cared for properly they will last a very long time. I personally like the Eclipse, their COMBERS and their MOP brushes (they don't shed).

"Synthetic Mongoose" an exciting new range designed to closely mimic the real thing at a lower price. Has much more spring than Sable and yet softer than Bristle. Easy to clean. Will control your oil or acrylic paint a treat!



#### **Mediums and Solvents**

#### Mediums

Let me save you a lot of trouble on this one....there are a million to choose from. I was blessed early on with an instructor who introduced me to my favorite medium, **Chroma Archival Lean medium**. I use it because it is odorless, makes my paint glide easily on the surfaces and is fast drying. This allows me to paint my underpainting and continue to paint my next layer while it cures.





Always remember when oil painting to paint your layers **FAT over Lean**. What does this mean? Oil paint doesn't dry, it oxidizes and cures. Here is the simple explanation from Wikipedia:

**Fat over lean. Fat over lean** refers to the principle in **oil painting** of applying paint with a higher **oil** to pigment ratio (**'fat'**) **over** paint with a lower **oil** to pigment ratio (**'lean'**) to ensure a stable paint film, since it is believed that the paint with the higher **oil** content remains more flexible.


When you use a medium in the early stage of your painting you are making it leaner, using less oil. One of the major ingredients of oil paint is oil. Different paints use different kinds of oil. This is a topic all by itself. As paint cures, if you don't follow this rule, your painting will crack over time.

### Solvents

Assuming you want a safe environment, you will want to use an odorless solvent. I have found that most artists use **Gamblin Gamsol Odorless Mineral Spirits**. I really like it and in addition to using it to clean my brushes I often use it to thin my paint when painting. It is very versatile. If you attend workshops, most instructors will insist you use this. The old turpentine is no longer acceptable. An alternative is Weber's Odorless Turpenoid. Turpenoid is less expensive but should not be used as a paint thinner. You can buy both of these from www.dickblick.com





### Weber Odorless Turpenoid




Turpenoid as a medium with artists' oil colors and varnishes. It...

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#### Varnish

Again, lots of choices. I prefer to use spray to avoid brush marks. My go to brand is **Grumbacher**. There are three versions I use depending on the application need. If the painting is finished and cured, usually takes a month or two, I like the Damar Gloss or Matte finish spray varnish. If I have put a painting aside for a time, or I have glossy and dull spots due to the use of my medium, I will use the Grumbacher Retouch Spray Varnish to even out the surface. You can paint over this varnish. Be sure to read the directions for proper drying times.



### **Painting Surfaces**

This is a very individual preference category and will depend on the look you are trying to achieve. Also, a category where going cheap will give you disappointing results.



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#### **Stretched Canvas**

I suggest for practice you use Artist's Loft Level 1 or 2 stretched canvas from Michaels. Watch for sales and use your coupons. When you're ready, upgrade to **Artist's Loft Level 3**. The stretching, corners and backing are better. In all cases regardless of Level you will need to put an additional 2 coats of gesso on before painting so the canvas doesn't suck up all your pigment. Art Alternatives has been the best performing gesso for me. It's also sold at Michael's in store and online. Apply 2 coats letting each dry a few hours in between. No sanding needed.



### **Ampersand Gesso Boards**

Ampersand Gesso Board is by far my favorite surface. It is smooth but still has tooth. It's easy to transport and easy to frame and comes in huge variety of sizes and shapes. It's basically Masonite board with a prepared surface. No additional gesso needed. You can get it with a cradled wood side. It doesn't need to be framed it if you want a more modern look. The wood sides can be stained, painted or left bare wood but they must be sealed the same as your actual painting (another good reason to use spray varnish). Best to use painter's tape to cover the cradled sides before you start painting. ### **Your Painting Workspace**

#### **Easels**

You may already have one. If so, use what you have. I prefer to stand when I paint, and I have upgraded my easel 3 times over the last 3 years. If you have the space, this is my favorite. Very versatile as it adjusts many ways, lays flat and comes with casters so you can move it around. I'll warn you, it takes up space and does not fit easily through door openings, so best to buy only if you have a dedicated space. I purchased the U.S. Art Supply Extra Large Double Mast Wooden H-Frame Studio Easel with Artist Storage Tray from www.amazon.com for under \$250



### **Miscellaneous Supplies**

#### **Container for Solvent and Medium**

I clean and re-use a Talenti Gelato container and put a plastic scrubby in the bottom when I studio paint. When I am traveling, I use a **Tosnail stainless steel leak-proof washer**. You can find this on <a href="https://www.amazon.com">www.amazon.com</a> For my Medium, I use a small plastic container the size of an old film container that seals tightly.
